5 hours.





TROPICAL EXPO DISPLAY 18th, 19th, 20th May.

present a theme eg. edible plants, Protaceae, Bird & Butterfly plants, Native palms.

be visually appealing and captivate the observer.

be informative.

not be too cluttered.

This year's display will be set up in a 6m x 3m area. Free standing boards (HELP) will be used to display photographs and interpretive material and tables arranged to display fruit, seeds, pods, flowers and promotional handouts.

Because we have had limited time to discuss the display one particular theme has not been chosen. This year will be a variety show based on several themes.

MARCH EXCURSION.

The March excursion was held on March 25th, when six members visited the National Parks Nursery at Lake Eacham for a conducted tour of the nursery and surrounds. Nigel Tucker, the nursery manager was our tour guide. explaining how and why the nursery was set up. Most of the plants are used in revegetation of National Parks, such as Lake Barrine, Mossman Gorge and Eubanangee Swamp.

Nigel then took us on a tour of his plantings of the families, Lauraceae, Moraceae, Myrtaceae and Proteaceae. These plantings are very extensive and will be suitable for scientific studies in the future.

The final area to be looked at was a planting of mixed timber species. Five Eucalypt species and a mixture of rainforest species were selected and planted out in a degraded area covered with lantana. The results are extremely promising for timber production, especially around gullies etc., on farms.

The excursion was very successful and I would like to thank Nigel for spending a large part of his Sunday with us.
