The Australian Cultivar Registration Authority has recently produced a booklet on cultivars called "Garden Varieties of Australian Plants", Vol.1. HAVE YOU HEARD OF MELIOIDOSIS ??

"Melioidosis is a tropical disease of man (rare) and animals caused by a bacillus that lives in the subsoils of Northern Australia, South East Asia and tropical Africa. The bacillus appears on the surface during the wet season and enters the body by contaminating cuts and woulds or by the inhalation of surface water that has entered creeks and rivers.

It cannot be contracted directly from infected patients or animals.

The serious form of the disease causes a variety of symptons, the important ones being high fever, muscle aches, vomiting, diarrhoea, chest pains, cough and pustular rash. This variety in Australia is almost entirely associated with pre-existing depression of health due to chronic alcoholism, diabetes and other diseases or with medical treatment that interferes directly with the body's defence systems. Examples of such conditions are leukaemia, lymphoma and AIDS as well as certain drugs used in the treatment of other medical conditions.

In the early stages it can be easily confused with a number of less serious conditions and the danger is a late start with the correct treatment. Anyone directly exposed to surface water who develops a severe illness should urgently obtain full medical assessment.

Prevention is avoidance of or full protection from surface water, especially in the wet season and ensuring that people with any of the above risk factors are not in the field."

WHAT'S FLOWERING AT WATSONVILLE Contrib. Helen Moody Last Sunday was a beautiful day on the Walsh River (down Bischoff Mill Rd) near Watsonville. The weather was fine & warm, the creek & river were running at normal flow with evidence that the water had been raging through the area in the preceeding weeks.

In the clayey soil of the river banks the resurrection ferns were looking quite green & healthy amongst the grasses.

The only Grevilleas in flower were G.dryandri. I only managed to find 2 plants & as usual the flower was the biggest part of the specimen. The Grass trees (even growing in the river bed) had developed their flowering spikes & were a constant source of food for insects & birds.

Bossiaea armittii had yellow flowers on the end of its strange flattened strap like leaves.

As usual Helichrysum newcastlianum was in flower along the roadside and I found 2 clumps of Polycarpea spirostylis also in flower. This is an attractive little plant with red stems & pink/white flowers - no more than 25cm high. It is supposed to be an indicator for copper.

I noticed one specimen of Gastrolobium grandiflorum (Poison Pear) in flower. It is an attractive plant with its greyish foliage & deep red/maroon pea shaped flowers.

The quinine bush Petalostigma banksii & Callitris columellaris both had seed pods on them. In the latter species pods were noticed on plants no more than 1m high.

The perfume from the various Acacias in flower was quite delightful - I wish I could tell you the names but unfortunately I did not have my reference book with me & did not pick any specimens.

No Eucalypts were flowering (that I noticed anyway) but I did glimpse a lone Abelmoschus moschatus.

While this area is not as rich in numbers of attractive flowering species as the Jumna Creek area it is still worth a visit and is a great place for a picnic.
